The policy seeks to increase the Gross Enrollment Ratio (GER) in school education from 28% to 50% and in higher and professional education from 5% to 20% by 2030. - ✚ The policy's broad and ambitious vision lacks clearly defined timelines and measurable performance indicators, making evaluation and monitoring difficult.

- ✓ **Teacher Training and Resistance to Change:** There is a persistent shortage of adequately trained teachers capable of delivering competency-based and multidisciplinary education, alongside resistance among educators to moving away from traditional rote-learning approaches.
- ✓ **Digital Divide:** Limited access to digital resources—available to only around 30% of students—poses a significant barrier to the policy's technology-driven learning framework.
- ✓ **Administrative and Systemic Challenges:** The introduction of a four-year undergraduate programme, the Multiple Entry–Exit System and the integration of vocational education present substantial logistical, scheduling and curriculum-design complexities.
- ✓ **Equity and Access Concerns:** Although the policy aims to enhance access for marginalized groups, inadequate implementation risks widening disparities between well-resourced institutions and underfunded ones.

- ✓ **Higher Education Expansion:** The objective of raising the Gross Enrolment Ratio (GER) in higher education to 50% by 2035 necessitates the creation of extensive new infrastructure, presenting a formidable logistical and financial challenge.
